A MESSAGE FROM THE **EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR**

2018 has been a transformative year for VOICES for Alabama's Children. After five years of astonishing leadership as executive director, Melanie Bridgeforth left VOICES to take an executive position at a large funding organization. I stepped into the Executive Director role in September of 2018 and began the process of leading this incredibly important and influential organization. Since then, we have recruited, hired, and onboarded two new employees, two fellows, and an intern. The faces of VOICES look different than they did a year ago, but the purpose, passion, and perseverance have only deepened.

The year opened with a significant and hard fought win through our advocacy efforts with the passage of HB 76, known as the Child Care Safety Act. HB 76 began the process of addressing the loopholes surrounding license exempt facilities making child care safer for all of Alabama's children. Additionally, VOICES released the 25th edition of our *Alabama Kids Count Data Book*, which a wide variety of groups have identified as the single most important data source in the state for children's health, education, safety, and economic security.

VOICES has worked to give Alabama's children a voice at the state capitol for more than 25 years. This voice has been influential with both state legislators as well as state agencies whose work impacts our children. We have worked diligently to develop long term partnerships with those whose decisions impact children across the state. In addition to our advocacy and lobbying efforts in Montgomery, the VOICES staff serve on nearly 50 committees, taskforces, and boards, representing a wide variety of children's issues from hunger to sex trafficking to literacy.

All of our efforts in Montgomery and across the state are built on the incredible support and input of our nearly 5,000 members of the VOICES Child Advocacy Network, who represent every race/ethnicity, background, geographic area, and perspective. We would not have the impact or influence without the perspectives and action from our incredible advocates.

VOICES recognizes that we speak on behalf of the next generation of Alabamians. We commit to work every day so that the Alabama they build is a better state, a more successful state. We appreciate your support and look forward to the challenges and opportunities ahead!

HOW WE APPROACHED **PUBLIC AWARENESS**

VOICES and VOICES' issues were **mentioned over 282 times** in print media, television news, or online media, which **was seen by approximately 2,629,146,941 people in Alabama** and beyond.



The issue of child care licensing in Alabama was mentioned 87 times in the media in 2018.



Alabama's First Class Pre-K was mentioned in the media more than 600 times.



VOICES has 2,993 followers on Facebook. Our posts were seen 539,652 times and engaged with 434,720 times.



VOICES staff collaborated and served on more than 50 committees, taskforces, and boards representing a wide variety of issues.

HOW WE APPROACHED ADVOCACY



In 2018, around 200 advocates rallied at the state house for VOICES' 5th Annual Child Advocacy Day to urge lawmakers to keep children's issues a top priority in Alabama.



More than 100 advocates engaged in training to empower their voice during the 2018 election cycle at our statewide conference.



In 2018, VOICES conducted and participated in 36 presentations or events reaching 7,000 people. Of those, 411 took action by signing petitions, letters of support, signing up for VOICES CAN.
